## **Uncovering the Hidden Histories of Mineral Oil Exploration in the East Midlands**

Until the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, sperm, tallow and palm oils provided Britain with artificial lighting. This changed with the introduction of mineral oils which provided a constant source of pure, bright white light. Victorian enlightenment has been studied from a plethora of different perspectives, notably in literature, science and the arts. Moreover, light in darkness has been explored as a symbol of Christianity, Victorian civility, sanctity and progress through explorers such as David Livingstone. Enlightenment, as a Victorian ideology, is deeply etched into the history of the East Midlands. This talk reveals how the science of geological exploration created a physical as well as metaphorical symbol of enlightenment, distributed globally through paraffin oil and candles. During the 1840's, in a coal mine located in the heart of Derbyshire, the accidental discovery of a bituminous substance would change the world forever. The characters involved in the discovery altered man's relationship with the science of geology, reformed British education, advised on British politics, worked to abolish slavery and ultimately reconfigured a low key side line venture in Derbyshire into the multi-billion pound global oil industry that we know today.

## The Problems of Chirotherium and the Triassic Environment

The footprints called 'Chirotherium' because of their resemblance to human hands were found in Triassic sandstone from Germany in 1834 and Cheshire in 1838. As no bones or other fossil remains were found at either locality, the trackmaker's identity was a mystery. Mammals were first suggested but in 1842 Richard Owen confidently identified the prints as those of labyrinthodont amphibians. In the twentieth century it was suggested that pseudosuchian reptiles were more likely candidates and this view was confirmed with the discovery in Switzerland of the skeleton named *Ticinosuchus ferox*.

British geologists have traditionally regarded the Triassic landscape as being that of an arid desert with little or no vegetation. Conversely the German view had been of a semi-arid environment with a sparse but varied vegetation. Recent research on the Wirral Peninsula has provided support for the German interpretation. The Lluta valley in the Atacama Desert of Chile appears to provide a surprisingly close approximation to the Triassic environment.
